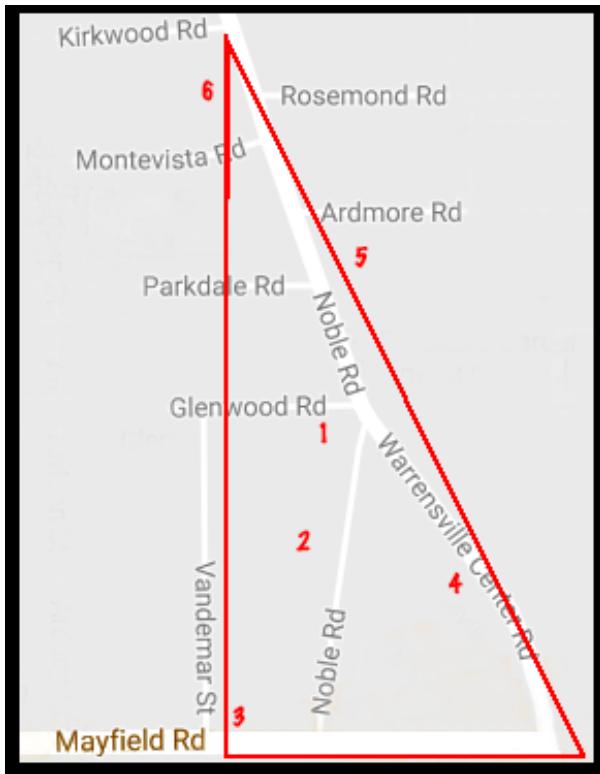


Walking the Triangle District



In preparation for the July 9 workshop, we invite you to expand your knowledge of the Triangle District.

We've mapped out a 6-stop walking tour of the "study area" to get you started. A goal of the workshop is to encourage pedestrian-friendly development, so we suggest participants tour the area on foot, if possible.

Investigate all six areas, or only a few. Look closely. Observe the details you may never have noticed before. Consider the atmosphere as well as the visuals.

Do you feel invited to stay and relax, bring your friends and socialize, or do you want to hurry through to a more attractive place? Unleash your imagination. Consider a community event showing an outdoor movie. Where might that be? Visualize a courtyard tucked into an unused nook. Picture lively streetscapes with banners, gardens, and amenities.

Area	Questions	Comments
1	Glenwood and Noble	
	Take a 360-degree view in the middle of the empty lot at Glenwood and Noble. What uses of this lot would be compatible with the surroundings?	
2	BNH Building	
	Imagine you are a tenant in the BNH Building. What would invite you to stay in the district after work?	
3	Mayfield and Vandemar	
	From the corner of Mayfield and Vandemar, travel east. How many businesses' signs can you read? Does this feel like an inviting area in which to walk and shop?	

Area	Questions	Comments
4	Warrensville Center Rd	
	Travel east on Mayfield Rd., turn left onto Warrensville Center Rd. What adds beauty, visual interest to the area? Do you feel safe as a pedestrian?	
5	Parkdale and Noble	
	Travel north along Noble Rd. on the east side of the street from Glenwood to Kirkwood. What would make this area more inviting?	
6	Kirkwood and Noble	
	On the west side of Noble Rd. between Kirkwood and Montevista are three civic spaces: a church, a public library, and a school. Are there streetscape improvements that might visually unify the three?
